# Dear Friends,

Welcome to Central Clinic Behavioral Health's consolidated Winter 2017 newsletter and the FY 2015-16 Annual Report. It is our pleasure to share that once again staff and our collaborative partners rose to the occasion and delivered superior results. Our goal is our mission – provide culturally sensitive and outcome-driven behavioral health, substance abuse, forensic and prevention services to children, adults, and families. To achieve our mission, we connect the right people to the right behavioral health service at the right time.

Compassionate and credentialed staff delivered programs and services to thousands of people in Greater Cincinnati and Butler County offices. The **Adult Services** division helped 2,053 men and women with individualized services to optimize their well-being. A new initiative, the **Transgender Wellness Program**, continues to provide a safe and comfortable environment for the 50 individuals who come to us for support.

**CDC Behavioral Health Services** provides psychological testing and treatment services to children, families, and adults in Butler County. Last year staff helped 1,676 children and their families navigate their way through mental health and addiction issues. 313 children and their families became stronger in our **Family Healing Center**.



Healthy children and their families keep our community vibrant. 3,072 people received mental health services in a variety of office-based and community settings through our **Child & Family Treatment Center**. The goal is always to assist children to be emotionally and developmentally prepared to be successful in their school and home environments. Of the many impactful programs delivered, we are especially proud of helping the very youngest of our community – 641 children thrive because of the **Young Child Institute**.



The judicial system allows our **Court Clinic** division to really make a difference in the lives of people who are addicted to opiates and those who have other offenses. 60 judges in the State of Ohio have referred adults to us for forensic evaluations and treatment services, including in-depth assessments and treatment of mental health and/or addiction issues. An award-winning, high-impact program, **Alternative Interventions for Women**, enjoys a low recidivism rate of an average of 12%. What this means is that 88% of women in this program who suffer from addiction, trauma and/or mental health issues do not reoffend.

Finally, **Mental Health Access Point** (MHAP) assisted 1,682 people. As the front door to the Hamilton County public mental health system, MHAP's primary mission is to provide a standardized entry to a system of care that ensures that services are available, accessible, and of high quality. We do this 24/7 and make a huge impact on people who need us.

When people are mentally and emotionally healthy, they feel better...they feel empowered...they reconnect with their family and their community. Everyone benefits. Thank you for the many ways you support every person we assist.
