Message from the President/CEO & Chair of the Board

What a difference 100 years makes! What began in 1923 has evolved over the past 100 years into an award-winning behavioral health services organization serving nearly 18,000 people per year – Central Clinic Behavioral Health.

Established in 1923 with a five-year, \$30,000 investment from Community Chest (now United Way), Central Clinic Behavioral Health (CCBH) was the first mental health nonprofit organization in the State of Ohio and one of the only community clinics serving both children and adults. Central Psychiatric Clinic, its original name, received national attention because it provided community-based mental health services for children — a different approach for treating patients at that time. The uniqueness of CCBH is evident in every service delivered – every patient/client experiences hope. Services are accessible, individualized, effective, consumer-oriented, recovery/resiliency-based, and trauma-informed.

A centennial in business deserves celebration. We kicked off the year with an event celebrating our personnel – they are the ones who make it happen every day at CCBH. This special edition of our newsletter focuses on our 100th anniversary. While every employee – every therapist – every funder – every stakeholder is vital to our success, we have invited division directors and administrative personnel to share their thoughts around this milestone.

Dr. Walter S. Smitson, president/CEO has announced his retirement. Dr. Smitson has made an extraordinary impact on CCBH during his 55-year tenure. Dr. Smitson joined Central Psychiatric Clinic (now Central Clinic Behavioral Health) as an assistant professor at the University of Cincinnati's Department of Psychiatry in 1967 and has been its president/CEO since 1973. Driven by a passion for helping people reach their full potential, Dr. Smitson expanded Central Clinic's reach, budget, and staff, increasing the Clinic's budget from \$500,000 to \$20 million and growing its professional staff from 35 to 250 (plus psychiatric residents from UC's College of Medicine in addition to social work, counseling, and psychology interns from area universities).

Enjoy this special edition and please know that we are profoundly grateful to personnel, donors, funders, key stakeholders, and most of all, our patients/clients who put their behavioral health care in our hands every day. **Thank you.**
